

Reflection

Another week has gone by and we are still waiting and hoping for news that a vaccine has been found that will save us from the devastation of lockdown.

In our Gospel Jesus is speaking to people who are waiting and hoping for a messiah, someone who will deliver them from Roman rule and set up God as king in their land. And they hope that Jesus is that saviour. It has been exciting to see his power to heal people. When he preaches his words are powerful. They feel forgiven and loved by God. But beyond that nothing is happening. No obvious progress has been made towards the new kingdom.

Well, Jesus says, God's new kingdom is beginning right now, but it starts in a tiny way like someone planting a little mustard seed. If you are patient, you will find it growing into one of the largest garden shrubs. Or putting it another way, God's kingdom starts like a bit of yeast put into some dough but watch and see how the loaf expands. These two little parables say that God's rule does not burst on the earth in a blaze of glory. He sets things going in small and unobtrusive ways and they grow and expand.

This was true of the way the Christian church spread around the world from such small beginnings. And though the churches remain relatively small even now, we see them influencing far more people than we expect. Birds come and nest in the mustard bush. God uses his people to provide shelter and welfare for others. When we see something that is wrong in society and start a movement, against slavery for instance or a fair-trade or a recycling campaign, attitudes in the wider society begin to change.

So our first lesson here is to have patience and hope as we trust in God. But that does not mean we stand aside to wait. Our next pair of parables tell us that God's kingdom grows and expands through people who discover the value of God's reign in their hearts. One captures the energy and excitement of someone who has found buried treasure. It's far more valuable than anything else that he has. It's worth selling everything to buy the field so that he can be the legal owner of the hoard. It is easy to see why this labourer would be so joyful. He expects to make a great profit on the deal. But what about the jeweller in the next story? He gives everything he has got, to take hold of the pearl of great price. For him it is the sheer wonder and beauty of that pearl which motivates him.

So our second lesson is this. We only see a tiny bit of God's reign: what God is doing round the world and through human history. But he invites us to be part of it and to accept his call as the thing of greatest value in our lives. We all fall short of this most of the time. Our final parable about a fishing net forms a pair with the one last week about the weeds among the wheat. It reminds us that there is good and bad mixed up in all of us and there are people we would judge good or bad in all communities. It will be God's job and not ours to sort out in the end who or what is fit to last for eternity.

We don't know if the vaccine will come or what the new normal will be like. These unusual days offer us a challenge to examine our ambitions and desires. Do we value the love and leadership of God in our hearts as the most precious gift of our lives? If we were back at the beginning of our working days and God was saying to us in a dream, "Ask what I should give you as a gift for your life ahead", would we, like King Solomon, ask for wisdom 'to discern and choose what is right'?

Can we say with St Paul that neither poverty or peril nor riches or power will ever be able to separate us from the love of God whose Son died and rose for us and whose Spirit lives in our innermost being. For that is the treasure.

We remember also those many countries riven by war, the bloodshed, the sufferings, the deaths of the innocent. We remember too, in the aftermath of the death of George Floyd, how soon we forget these things, and move on.

We pray for all who suffer, in mind, body or estate, for those locked down in isolation, for those who are sick, for those who have been recently bereaved, especially at this time when funerals have to be small in number, and briefly held. And we remember those who have died recently, in the faith of Christ, and those whose faith is known to God alone. In silence let us bring to God those who are closest to our hearts today.

may we have you at our side
and may your promise sustain us

So, as we close, let us thank God for his great goodness to us and ask Him to take us, and all those we love, safely through this day .

There will be a shortened Holy Communion said service in all our churches on Sunday 2nd August at the following times:


St Mary & St John's Hardraw – 9.00am
