## The blessing of a party

Weddings are usually saved up to be the last scene of a feel-good film or story. The characters, having been through many twists and turns, end up dancing on the stage together and rejoicing in the kiss between the bride and groom. That is why the imagery of a wedding appears in our reading from Revelation.

The climax of the Christian story is a crowd gathered in heaven, dressed like a beautiful bride. The Saviour who sacrificed himself for them, the Lamb, is revealed and there is rejoicing, praise and an overwhelming current of love. John, in exile on the island of Patmos, encourages his readers to live their lives through troubled times in secure hope of a final happy ending. But in our gospel we see that the public revealing of Jesus began at a wedding.

The mother of Jesus cares deeply that the wine has run out. Nobody wants embarrassment or disappointment at a wedding. It is one of the heartbreaks of lockdown that long-planned weddings have had to be cancelled or scaled down. Mary turns to Jesus. She may not have expected a miracle, maybe just his power to rally people locally to provide more wine. Or maybe she did hope for a decisive miracle that would make everyone acknowledge Jesus to be the Messiah, as the angels had promised her. Jesus in his reply makes it clear that he is now no longer under her maternal authority. Her local concerns are no longer his priority. He also says, ‘My hour has not yet come’. His vindication as Messiah will not come until his resurrection. But she sees he is going to do something. She asks the servants to cooperate with him and quietly he gets them to fill the jars used for purification rites with water and they discover that they are pouring out wine. The party becomes amazingly joyful.

In the telling of this story the evangelist has summed up Jesus’ earthly ministry. He loves ordinary people. He cares about their needs and their celebrations. He has come to bring the presence and the reign of God into their lives. The mention of those jars is a hint that the rituals of washing and sacrifice to deal with guilt and pronounce forgiveness will be made redundant by his death. Today people worldwide eat bread and drink wine to remember that Jesus died for all and God is gracious to forgive. Last Monday was supposed to be the day when the largest number of people in Britain suffer from depression in the slump after Christmas. So let those of us, for whom Christmas is the birth of our Saviour do our best to be uninhibited in our love and joy for the epiphany of our bridegroom and let our joy overflow as widely as it can.


We will keep you informed of other events taking place as we respond to this 3<sup>rd</sup> lockdown.


