From the Vicarage: 'Love Actually'



Valentine's Day this year falls on a Sunday. The last time this occurred was in 2016 BC (Before Covid *and* before 'Clarkie's') I wonder what the day means to you?

There are many different stories surrounding St. Valentine; perhaps this is because the St. Valentine who inspired our current celebrations may have been two different men. He is known to have died around the year 270 with one account stating him to have been a Temple Priest and another a Bishop. Whatever his role was, he was martyred for his faith during Claudius II's persecution of the Church.

There are various legends that have become attached to his name and his association with love and lovers - that he defied the Emperor's orders and secretly married couples to spare the husbands from fighting in the war; that he cut out the shape of hearts from parchment and shared them with imprisoned Christians to remind them of God's love and another that after his own arrest, imprisonment and torture he wrote a thank you letter to his gaolers daughter for her kindness, signed 'from your Valentine'.

I've always enjoyed the Richard Curtiss film '**Love Actually**'. In the opening monologue, Hugh Grant's character David speaks over a montage of different people meeting one another at the arrivals gate of Heathrow Airport.

'General opinion's starting to make out that we live in a world of hatred and greed, but I don't see that. It seems to me that love is everywhere. Often, it's not particularly dignified or newsworthy, but it's always there: fathers and sons, mothers and daughters, husbands and wives, boyfriends, girlfriends, old friends... If you look for it, I've got a sneaky feeling that love actually is all around.'

Dr Gary Chapman's book 'The five Love Languages' was first published in 1992 and has sold over 13 million copies. He states that we have five essential ways of expressing our love for one another. These are, words of affirmation, spending quality time, the giving of gifts, acts of service and physical touch and, according to Chapman, the most popular is words of affirmation.

With the annual celebration of Love falling on a Sunday, it gives us a fresh opportunity to look again at the narrative that extends throughout the entire Bible; God's deep love for us all and for all that he has created. **Psalm 103** is full of expressions of this love and how God has shown it: he forgives our sins, heals our wrongs, provides us with good things, is full of compassion, caring, considerate, faithful etc etc. John's gospel and first letter reminds us that in the gift of Jesus, God has touched us all with his greatest gift. All of this given freely that we might once again live in a restored relationship with him. God loves us, but for a relationship of love to develop and grow that love must be reciprocated.

In the OT **Moses** is instructed by God to speak to the people and to tell them how their lives can be full of joy, peace and satisfaction. It's an invitation to relationship and blessing. They are to *'Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength.'* Deuteronomy 6:v5

The shorter Westminster Catechism of 1648 puts it like this:
'A man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy him forever.'

I love the invitation from God for us to **enjoy** him. Love should be enjoyable. Love should be fun. Love should not be a chore. Loving God shouldn't be that different from loving any other human being. We can show him our love by wanting to spend time with him, enjoying learning more about him, appreciating his unique qualities, participating in what he finds important and giving him gifts our praise, our worship, our lives.

I spoke last week of the very real pain and anxiety that is in the world and our nation at the moment. We have all been touched with the hardship that the virus has brought but some have experienced this to a much greater cost. Our hearts cry out 'How much longer?' and 'Why?' A relationship based on love can accept these questions being asked in frustration and even anger but many struggle with the idea of such a relationship with God. They see him as angry, oppressive, restrictive, outdated and dusty, a figment of the imagination. It was Abraham Lincoln who once said of a difficult individual: *'I don't like that man. I must get to know him better.'* The promise of God is that he is not hiding and that if we want to find him we can and we will. Jer29:13

If we have attitudes of animosity or even indifference towards God then the answer is in getting to know him better. As we do, we will see that the languages of love that Dr Chapman identifies and speaks of with such enthusiasm have all been displayed in His character since the very beginning of time.

I close with a wonderful truth. We are not alone. We are loved and we are called to love.
What better thought for the days that we are living in and on this Valentine's day?

Loving God completely

Praise the LORD, my soul;
all my inmost being, praise his holy name.
² Praise the LORD, my soul,
and forget not all his benefits—
³ who forgives all your sins
and heals all your diseases,
⁴ who redeems your life from the pit
and crowns you with love and compassion,
⁵ who satisfies your desires with good things
so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's.
⁶ The LORD works righteousness
and justice for all the oppressed.
⁷ He made known his ways to Moses,
his deeds to the people of Israel:
⁸ The LORD is compassionate and gracious,
slow to anger, abounding in love.
⁹ He will not always accuse,

⁹ "As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you.
Now remain in my love. ¹⁰ If you keep my
commands, you will remain in my love, just as I have
kept my Father's commands and remain in his
love. ¹¹ I have told you this so that my joy may be in
you and that your joy may be complete. ¹² My
command is this: Love each other as I have loved
you. ¹³ Greater love has no one than this: to lay down
one's life for one's friends. ¹⁴ You are my friends if you
do what I command. ¹⁵ I no longer call you servants,
because a servant does not know his master's
business. Instead, I have called you friends, for
everything that I learned from my Father I have made
known to you. ¹⁶ You did not choose me, but I chose
you and appointed you so that you might go and bear
fruit—fruit that will last—and so that whatever you
ask in my name the Father will give you. ¹⁷ This is my
command: Love each other.

⁷ Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes
from God. Everyone who loves has been born of
God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does
not know God, because God is love. ⁹ This is how God
showed his love among us: He sent his one and only
Son into the world that we might live through
him. ¹⁰ This is love: not that we loved God, but that he
loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for
our sins. ¹¹ Dear friends, since God so loved us, we
also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever
seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us
and his love is made complete in us.
