## Walking with God in uncertainty

This week we have heard of the government's plans to bring forward the proposed ending to all Covid restrictions that we have faced over the last two years. The response has been, as perhaps anticipated, mixed. Some, understandably, remain rather wary of the suggestion whilst others will embrace the offered freedom very gratefully. We all respond to change in different ways as we measure what that change might mean to our own personal circumstances. It was spring 2020 when I wrote about the inevitable embracing of a 'new normal' that the pandemic would bring to us all, and it looks like spring 2022 might begin to reveal what that might actually look like.


In our gospel readings for the next few weeks Jesus speaks of a 'new normal' that is available to those who embrace the kingdom of God. What has become known as the Sermon on the Mount sets out a new reality as Jesus takes the accepted cultural standards and turns them upside down. Our accepted way of doing things, the familiar way of living life has undergone a radical change since 2020 and this will continue to create challenges in the months that lie ahead but the message in Luke 8 on Feb 20<sup>th</sup> reminds us that no matter what 'storms' we may have to face and deal with in our own lives, we need not face them alone. As I write I am aware that many of you are dealing with great distress, grief and uncertainty as a result of the lasting effects and impact of the virus but also as you manage and navigate the uncertainties of health, finances and relationships that everyday life creates for you.

Jesus understands that we will face all manner of upset and challenge in our lives but he always makes it clear that we need never be alone as we do so. He *always* speaks of life being different when we place our trust in him for today and that when we do so, we are then able to look with hope to the future.

Psalms 1 declares that when we place our trust in God we are like a tree that is planted or 'transplanted' in a refreshing and wholesome place. The place where we are receiving our nourishment has changed from the world, to God. Jesus sees the world differently and he calls us to partner with him and be blessed by doing the same.

You will read in this newsletter of the opportunity and invitation to become a member of a Home Group. It's a new venture and one which we believe will be transformational in helping us all to live our lives in the fullness of what God has intended by becoming a member of a small group that will meet regularly to pray and to study the Bible together. Please pray over this and consider your response as to how 2022 might be the start of a 'new normal' in your relationship with Jesus.

## Starting in March

As we marked the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our Queen's accession to the throne last Sunday, I was reminded of the powerful words spoken by the Archbishop of Canterbury at her coronation as he passed her a copy of the Bible. '*.. we present you with this Book, the most valuable thing that this world affords*'

The Bible speaks consistently of the value and importance in knowing God's word for our lives and 2022 has seen some of you begin to study the Bible in a new and more focussed way. It's lovely to hear of how you are already enjoying and reaping the benefits from doing so.

I am excited and delighted to be able to offer to you all a new way of engaging with God's word and the means by which you can grow in your understanding of God's love for you and enjoy fellowship and friendship at the same time.

We are to begin four **Home Groups** within the benefice this March. They will meet on different days and at different times to provide as wide an opportunity for as many of you as possible to engage with one of them. In the past we have used **Lent** as a time to gather together for a number of weeks to study a theme together: The Lord's Prayer, God's Grace, God's Freedom, God's Blessing & God's Love. A frequent response at the end of such a course has been a desire that the group might stay together in some way and so we now offer you that possibility.

Each Home Group would meet on a regular basis to enjoy each other's company but with the primary purpose of drawing closer to God and enjoying *His* company together. The leaders will be: Vera Sinton in Gayle, Mike and Pauline Hirst in Hawes, Julian and Barbara Spykerman in Burtersett and Stephanie Durrant in Askrigg. Each group will begin by looking at the subject of prayer; why pray, different ways of praying, how do we respond when we feel our prayers are not being answered, how to listen to God etc. Each session would last about an hour and involve a time of prayer and worship, watching a short video presentation and then discussion.

This is an **exciting** development in the life of the Church and details of the exact days and times will be mailed out shortly so; if you're interested, watch out for an email from the office and prayerfully consider if you would like to be a part of this new venture as we seek to grow in our relationship with God and walk in his strength and freedom together.
