From the Vicarage:

Surrounding ourselves with God's truth

I was recently taken with a report on a BBC Radio news broadcast that highlighted the latest advice from the 'International Society of Hypertension' Sept 15th In an attempt to reduce the number of high blood pressure cases that were on the increase across the nation they have released new guidance for us to follow. Amongst promoting a greater willingness to be grateful for all we have, quitting smoking and consuming less salt, the report says that we would all benefit from engaging in an act of meditation for approx. 45 minutes every day.

I love it when medical science finally catches up with God's advice. Jesus was a wonderfully holistic teacher, focussing on the body, mind and (essentially) our spirit. Throughout his life Jesus constantly promoted the daily need to have time on our own away from distraction, but, crucially, to spend this time in the presence of God in thoughtful reflection and prayer.

St Paul develops this further: 'Whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable, if anything is excellent or praiseworthy, think about such things and the God of peace will be with you'. Phil.4:8

I commend this wisdom to you ... it also saves a fortune on expensive classes!

With this in mind, please put the evening of **Saturday November 4**th in your diary as we bring a very different event to the area. 'Sing Good News Together' will be an evening of doing precisely that. An opportunity to hear and to join in with singing songs about the life and hope that Jesus brings. Issues of Stewardship - 2

Generosity: Our gifts and talents



At the heart of our faith is a personal response to a personal understanding of the wonder of God's love for us; that the greatest gift we can ever receive in this life is to know and to receive the gift of salvation through placing our faith in God's son, Jesus Christ. His sacrifice on the cross is the ultimate act of life changing generosity. So; if we have placed our trust in him, been 'Born Again' Jn.3:3 and received eternal life through a right standing before God the Father ... how should our lives look as a result?

Last month we explored the account of Jonah and his attitude towards God's generosity towards *all* people, even those we find personally disagreeable and difficult, and examined what attitudes we might be holding that prevent us from responding to God's call to live our lives generously.

This month I invite you to take a look at a rarely told event from the first book of Samuel in which King David meets and responds to two very different hearts and approaches to generosity.

I wonder what you consider are the things that you do well? What are your gifts and talents? Don't be shy .. we all possess something that we do well. Take a moment to consider what these might be. Hospitality? Music? Writing? Empathy? Care? Do you tend to use these gifts to enhance yourself, to build others up or to give glory to God? I wonder what would happen if we allowed God's Holy Spirit to guide us into using our gifts more effectively in His service? We might not know or see the results but the effect of acting with a heart of generosity can have far reaching consequences.



Turn to 1 Samuel 25:4-28 and read the account of the interaction of three different characters; David, the future King of Israel, Nabal, a wealthy but mean spirited man and his wife, Abigail.

David and his men have ensured the safety of Nabal's shepherds and flocks of sheep from marauding parties whilst they have been grazing the hills. During these months nothing went missing and nothing was asked of them but now, according to the culture of hospitality, Nabal should show his gratitude. He is perfectly able to do so, he is a very wealthy man but he violates this tradition by refusing David's request for anything he might

spare from the bounty of his harvest to feed his men and grievously insults David by doing so. Nabal asks an important question (v10-11), Abigail makes a request (v24-25) and David's response changes (v33-34).

It's striking how swiftly Abigail realises the danger of the situation and takes matters into her own hands to prevent disaster for Nabal and for David. As soon as she is made aware of the insult via an aggrieved servant, she responds with generosity out of her husband's great wealth: 'Abigail lost no time.' She certainly rights a wrong on Nabal's behalf but she also saves David from his own anger and from incurring the judgement of God through him slaughtering those innocent of any crime. Her prudent action keeps David's sword 'clean' enabling him in the future to take the throne destined for him.

It's not too difficult to make a comparison between David's protection of Nabal's shepherd's, flocks and servants and of the Lord's protection of his people; you and me. There should have been gratitude and appreciation for all that had been received at David's hands but instead there is greed, ingratitude and a failure to understand the manner in which they had been blessed. It is Abigail who averts the bloodshed, it is Abigail who displays her gratitude and it is Abigail who gives what is due out of her own blessings and her husband's riches. But there is more. Abigail absorbs the blame for her husband's foolish and selfish actions and response. How do you feel about her actions? Was it the right decision?

In the end this story had a happy ending (not necessarily for Nabal^{v37}) but Abigail could not have known that when she acted as she did and then told her husband of her actions. Sometimes we need to be prepared to take risks when seeking to live with generous hearts within God's will.

I wonder what you consider to be reasonable when it comes to acts of generosity. Where might you place a limit? Why? What is it that holds us back from living with truly generous hearts? How prepared are we to take criticism and face danger in order to ensure that the right thing is done?

Thank you for your love for us. Help us to listen to your calling in our lives. Help us to be prepared to spread your light in the darkness, that your love might be known throughout this Dale. Give us Lord, we pray, a generous heart towards everyone around us.
