# From the Vicarage: Balls, Batons and Ballots'

**July:** a General Election, the 'Euro24' Football Final and the Olympic games. What a month! There will inevitably be a mixture of celebration and commiseration as our hopes and expectations bring either delight or disappointment on the pitch, track or in the ballot box.

100 years ago the Christian sprinter Eric Liddell ran in the 1924 Paris Olympic Games. His exploits became the subject of the Oscar winning film **'Chariots of Fire'** in 1981. Liddell was born in northern China in 1902 to Scottish missionary parents. He was educated in London whilst his parents continued to work in China and it was at an early age that he made a personal commitment to follow Jesus Christ.

Whilst at school it became clear that he had a gift as an outstanding sportsman but it was later whilst at university that he moved his attention to athletics and became the fastest runner in Scotland. He was selected to run for his country in the 100m at the Paris Olympic Games and was seen as a firm favourite to bring home the Gold medal. Believing that his response to God's grace and goodness should begin by him honouring the Sabbath and keeping it free from sporting activity, he courageously withdrew from the 100m final when he discovered that it was to be run on a Sunday. Despite enormous pressure from the British Olympics management and the national newspapers for him to change his mind, he refused to compromise his faith and began to train at very short notice for the 200 and 400m races instead. He gained a bronze in the 200m and on the day of the 400m final he was handed a piece of paper with the following words from 1Samuel.2:30: *'He that honours me, I will honour'.* He ran the 400m race as if he was sprinting the 100m and won the Gold Medal.

Turning down various professional opportunities in sport, Liddell announced his firm conviction that 'God had made him for China' and he left in 1925 to become a teacher of English in a Christian College. He returned to Scotland to train as a Church leader and upon his return to China he married and began his missionary work. By 1941 the threat of a Japanese invasion was so great that British Nationals were advised to leave. Liddell's wife and family left for the UK but he decided to remain to help the Chinese people in those dark and difficult days.

He was imprisoned by the Japanese in a brutal prison camp but soon became a much respected leader amongst the inmates where he ran Bible studies and prayed regularly for their captors. Five months before liberation, the severely malnourished Liddell died of a brain tumour aged just 43. His gravestone bears the inscription from Isaiah 40:31 – *'They shall run and not be weary'.* 

The Bible describes our lives as a race – a race of unknown length and one in which none of us know when we will reach the finishing line. Eric lived his life full of faith and integrity, keeping the name and teaching of Jesus Christ his priority in all things. As we face the clamour and demands of modern life, I find that there is much in his life that we can be inspired by. The Bible was his guide, Jesus was his Saviour and his goal was to serve Him in every which way he could.

To quote the final words of our Communion liturgy



'With all these things in mind - Go in peace to love and serve the Lord'

### PARISH GIVING SCHEME

The Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) is a secure and simple way of giving to the church of your choice. It can be used to give regular monthly donations, or quarterly or annually if you prefer. Not ready for a regular commitment? Then you can use the scheme to make a one off donation whenever you want to make one!

Paying in regular amounts, using the PGS is very helpful for the Benefice as it helps with our cashflow and forecasting. The scheme works by making a Direct Debit from your bank account on the 1<sup>st</sup> of each month, which is credited to our parish accounts on 10<sup>th</sup> of each month. If you opt to add gift aid, as a taxpayer, at no extra cost to you, this is also passed back to our parishes.

You can also opt to increase your donation annually – if you do this you will always be asked by the PGS before it is increased whether you want to increase it and at that point you can opt to increase it, leave it the same, or indeed decrease it!

Setting up a regular gift with the PGS is really simple. Choose one of 4 ways:

- Or scan the QR codes below for Askrigg and Hawes
- Or phone 0333 002 1271 Monday to Friday 9am-5pm
- Or ask a PCC member for an application form which you can complete and post back to the PGS

At the current time, only Askrigg and Hawes are members of this scheme, but Hardraw and Busk will come on line shortly.
